2. Provide the name of project, a short description, street address, city, state and county.
3. Self explanatory.
4. State the total project value.
5. State the date any work started on the project.
6. Give the project completion date and indicate if the date is actual (that is, already completed) or estimated.
7. For residential building projects, state the number of stories and units.
8. For all projects, indicate whether the project is subject to a Federal (Davis-Bacon) wage determination, a state wage determination, or neither. If project is subject to both a Federal and State wage determination check both boxes.
9. Self explanatory.
10. Indicate ending date (mo., day, yr.) of the workweek in which wage rates were paid to the classification.
11. For the classification used on this project, please fill in number of Ironworkers employed during the week of peak employment. Indicate the number of employees paid at given rate.
12. Indicate the basic hourly rate. Do not give a pay range.
13. Self Explanatory.
14. Indicate by a check mark whether the contractor is signatory to a collective bargaining agreement under which the workers are paid.

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**Definitions for Types of Construction:**

Building Construction

Building construction generally is the construction of sheltered enclosures with walk-in access for the purpose of housing persons, machinery, equipment, or supplies. It includes all construction of such structures, the installation of utilities and the installation of equipment, both above and below grade.

Residential Construction

Residential projects for Davis-Bacon purposes are those involving the construction, alteration, or repair of single-family houses or apartment buildings of no more than four (4) stories in height. This includes all incidental items such as site work, parking areas, utilities, streets and sidewalks.

Heavy Construction

Heavy projects are those projects that are not properly classified as either "building", "highway", or "residential". Unlike these classifications, heavy construction is not a homogeneous classification. Because of this catch-all nature, projects within the heavy classification may sometimes be distinguished on the basis of their particular project characteristics, and separate schedules issued. For example, separate schedules may be issued for dredging projects, water and sewer line projects, dams, major bridges, and flood control projects.

Highway Construction

Highway projects include the construction, alteration or repair of roads, streets, highways, runways, taxiways, alleys, trails, paths, parking areas, and other similar projects not incidental to building or heavy construction.
